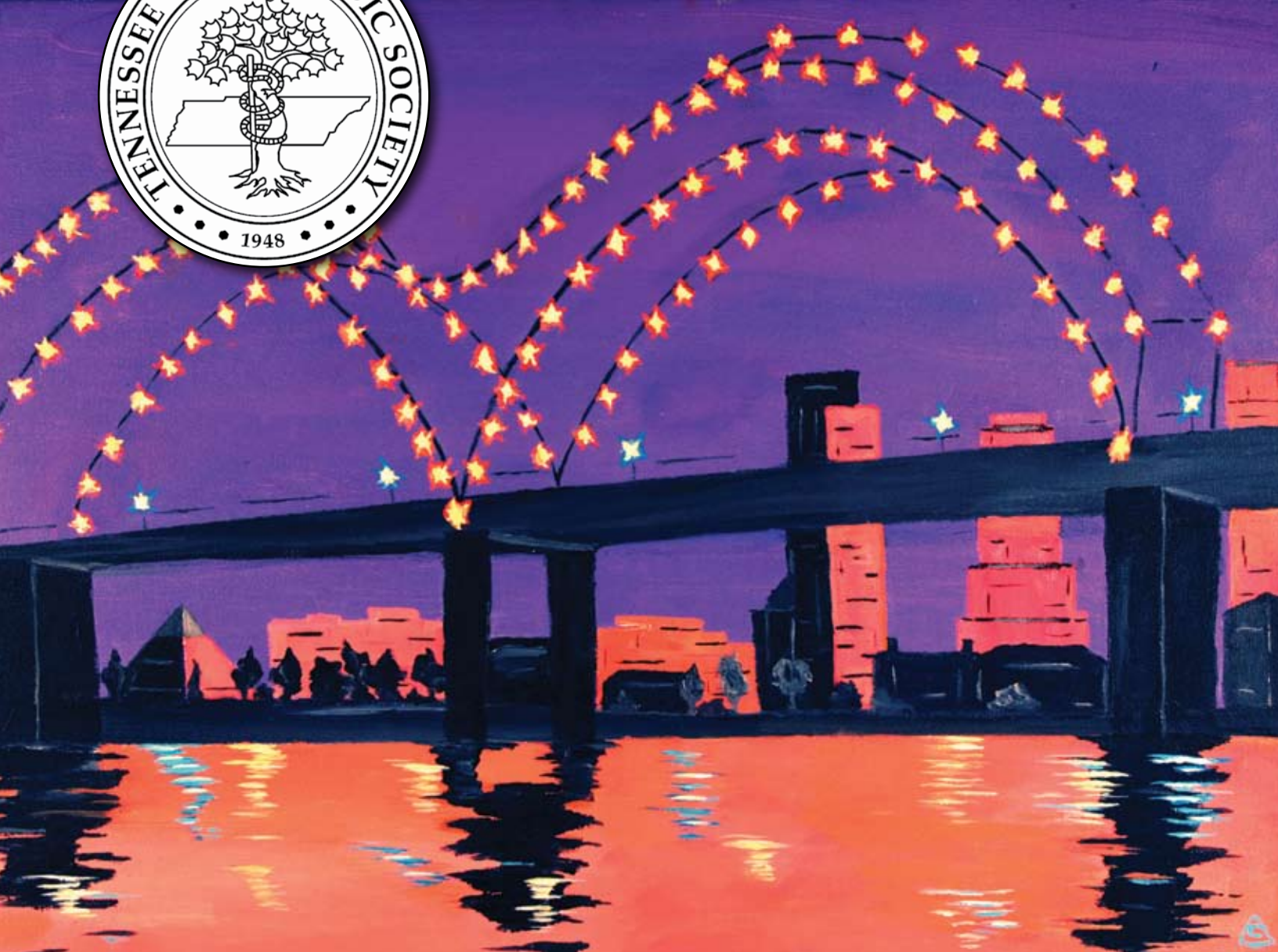
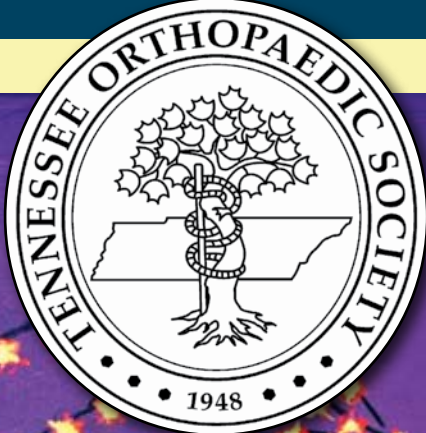

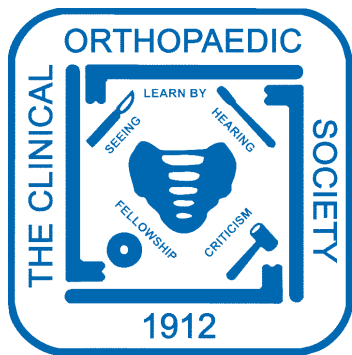

- 4** The candidate must submit an application, along with two letters of endorsement from members of the Tennessee Orthopaedic Society, to the membership committee by August 31 of each year.

Eligible and approved members will be presented at the TOS Annual Meeting, held in association with the Clinical Orthopaedic Society, September 27-29, 2007, at the Peabody Hotel, Memphis, Tennessee, and voted on by the attending membership, with election based upon a two-thirds vote.

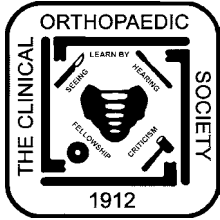
